## From Your Pastor



### *Dear Sisters and Brothers,*

Let's talk about change.

First, let's talk about staff changes. If you have any consternation about the staff changes at the church, remember this rubric I heard years ago and have tried to live by personally: "Good employers don't hold employees back from opportunities for success."

So while we're adjusting to seeing Melinda at the other end of the building and bidding Mason a fond farewell, we know that God has exciting things in store for us: Jonathan Crutchfield is completing a teaching engagement in South Africa and will be with us the first Sunday in September. Ellen Brown Landers and her team are diligently searching for our new Director of Children's Ministries. Our Human Resources Ministry team is looking at how best to staff the duties that Melinda will leave behind now that she's taken the reins of our preschool.

Please pray for all these transitions. That is something you, as members, can actively do to support your church as we live into this next season. That, and to show up for things. Even though we are in something of an "in-between" season this fall, showing up is still important because I promise you, when you show up, you're going to get something out of it. Sometimes it's as simple as renewing a friendship. It might be a new insight into God and your own life. But the reality that "you get out of it what you put into it" still carries. So pray for your church family and show up. That will cover a world of changes!

Second, let's talk about communion. I have, for years, been asked by members of the church if we could serve communion by intinction part of the time. (That's the way of serving where you come forward, take bread and dip it into the cup.) The Session has decided that it is time for us to give it a try.

There are several reasons to do it this way from time to time. One is that it allows the server and the receiver to share a more personal connection since we are doing more than passing a tray. As your minister, I'll actually get to serve you directly rather than through our elders. Another is that, with children in worship, it's important to provide them with opportunities to move around. It helps them learn and enables them to be fully included in the life of the congregation. I'll have instructions in the bulletin the first Sunday we try it this way, and please know this: we will always have a means to serve those who are unable to come forward for any reason. It is vitally important that when we celebrate the Lord's Supper, *everyone* is fed.

So, let's be open. Let's be open to where God is leading our congregation as we seek new staff members. Let's be open to the new ministries they will lead us in doing. Let's be open to different ways of worshipping.

When we are open, God can do a new thing. And I have every confidence that as God keeps doing new things here on Morningside Drive, we will be blessed, and we will be a blessing to others.

### MPC, MPP Staff Changes Bring Opportunities Along with Challenges

Everyone knows that Morningside is looking for someone to fill the new role of Director of Children's Ministries. This person will fulfill many of the responsibilities Melinda Sandkam leaves behind as she moves to direct our pre-school: supervising Sunday programs along with special events including Vacation Bible School, Mission Camp, the Christmas pageant, kids' activities at our annual retreat and the like.

Many now ask their friends, our elders and our pastors: what about all the rest of the things Melinda undertook? And the answer is—we're working on it. First, until we find that special DCM, Melinda will continue to supervise Sunday-morning activities on a contract basis this month, so our kids will have continuity in their classes. The other good news is that our Associate Pastor Drew Stockstill will follow his deep heart for mission by assuming responsibility for our service and outreach programs.

Our Strategic Planning Committee, led by Bobbie McCrackin, will begin an in-depth study of what we need in the way of staff now, in the mid-range and long-term. In the meantime, a transition team headed by Carolyn Morton and Lisa Jern will look at how we will address programs and events on the horizon (such as Sunday School Kick-Off, Congregational Nurture activities and the retreat), both those that will then go to the DCM and those that are currently unassigned.

One solution, which should be a no-brainer as MPC grows from a clergy-driven to a program-driven church, is a far greater role for our officers, committee chairs, and volunteers. For example, each ministry team will take responsibility for keeping its bulletin board up-to-date and attractive and for assuring a steady flow of information for all our media, internal and external. All of us are asked to search our hearts for where God is leading us for the benefit of this church and its people.

### August Communion Will Be Served by Intinction

It's been 12 or 15 years since our congregation has taken the Lord's Supper by means of intinction—except at our annual Maundy Thursday Supper during Holy Week. But we will return periodically to this ancient practice on occasion, beginning Sunday, Aug. 2. As you may have read in Baron's letter on the facing page, there are several reasons to follow this practice at least some of the time.

The word itself is from the Late Latin word for baptism, *intinctio*, made up from the words meaning 'dip in' or 'moisten'. At the July Session meeting, Baron trained ruling elders (aka Session members) how to assist our teaching elders (aka our pastors) in serving the bread and cup to the congregation. There will be instructions in Sunday's bulletin, as well as from the pulpit, when we begin.

The process is straightforward: to participate, the congregation will come up the center aisle by rows and step up to be served. Pull a sizable (so you won't dabble your fingers) piece of bread from the loaf, dip it in the cup and circle back to your seat via the side aisle.

Those who are not able to come forward will be served in their pews. Children who are not communicants may come forward with their families to receive a blessing. Those who are familiar with communion served this way suggest that we may all feel we've received an extra blessing.

Shalom uses the facilities of Memorial Drive Presbyterian Church at 5140 Memorial Drive, Stone Mountain. Following the workday, dinner will be served at 5 p.m. followed by square dancing.

Shalom is located in Clarkston, which has been called the most diverse square mile in America due to the number of refugees resettled there, resulting in more than 60 spoken languages and more than 145 countries represented within the community. The vast majority of Shalom's members are recently arrived refugees and immigrants from Africa who are adjusting to a new country, a new language, and a new way of life. Beginning Aug. 16, Middle Schoolers will meet at 4:30 p.m., followed by games, music and supper for all levels, then the Senior High meeting begins at 6:30 p.m. Both groups will continue to be led by Drew Stockstill and Landon Dillard, with activities and Bible discussion geared appropriately to age level. Each group will have their own advisors. The Senior Highs also will kick off the season on Saturday, Aug. 15, with a special activity still in the planning stages.

In October, the youth are looking forward to a retreat in Oconee, hosted at Eleanor Attwood's mountain house.

This year's youth service trip to New Orleans worked with Project Homecoming June 21-25. The team of 17 youth, plus driver/chaperones Duncan Spears, Diana Cochran and Ted Fleming and Drew, worked to repair homes damaged by Hurricane Katrina, learned about the economic, political, cultural and theological issues at work and built relationships with local residents, volunteers from other youth groups and one another. The team also had opportunities to explore New Orleans, eat snoballs, beignets and po-boys.

- Thanks to the leadership provided by Becky Schreiber for Morningside Presbyterian Preschool, our church has an improved and expanded playground. Session voted to add a shade structure (at the expense of MPP) to help avoid hot tots. The preschool has invested \$34,000 to upgrade our property.
- Julie Schoen is our new Children's Choir shepherd and she'll be coordinating with our new Organist/Choirmaster Jonathan Crutchfield to plan the kids' musical season. Because he will not be arriving until September, rehearsals won't begin until Sept. 16.
- Interviews are under way for the new Director of Children's Ministries. Our search team, headed by Ellen Landers, is making contacts and following leads, not just waiting for applications. The team is committed to finding the absolutely right person for this crucial job.
- In other human-resources news, the HR Committee and staff realize this is a perfect time to assess all our staffing needs both short- and long-term. To that end, our Strategic Planning Committee headed by Bobbie McCrackin will take over the task of assessing needs and creating a plan. (More information on Page 3.)
- Session voted to approve a special worship service, "The Blessing of the Animals," for October. Our first experience last year brought about 60 pets—or their pictures—to our church and was popular with our pet lovers.
- Session acknowledged the move of Nathan Zook and his family to Texas and the resignation of Ann Bowers, creating two vacancies on our Board of Deacons. Our deacons have been holding retreats and reassessing their mission and decided not to fill these spots until the next regular election of officers, rather than try to bring in new members during a time of transition.
- Beth Baer, Discipleship Ministries chair, had good news about the adult Faith Development fall curriculum. There's more detail on Page 8.
- By the way, have you noticed in the weekly Bulletin that we're about \$70,000 behind in pledges received for the year? If you've been distracted by summer activities, this is a reminder to catch up your pledge. All these sessions take place in Room 201 at 9:45 a.m. on Sundays. The Nursery is open, children and youth have their own classes—so take advantage of these outstanding opportunities to develop your faith.
