From the Pastor's Desk

Dear Friends,

Does it still sound sincere when I say I can't believe it's that time of year again? I feel like I say this every August/September. Right about the time I start to see school buses back on the roads, right about the time that every



church I've ever known kicks off Sunday School for the academic year, every year around this time, I shake my head in wonderment that in fact, it is *that time of year* again.

You'd think I'd see it coming, and yet every year it comes as a surprise to me that whatever break I thought I was going to enjoy during the summer is now a distant memory. You'd think I'd have learned by now, but it always sneaks up on me.

It feels sometimes like our lives are dictated by seasons: the change of the weather, the holidays, the breaks in programming. These seasons come and go and with them our lives drift this way and that, sometimes busier, sometimes slower. All the while, time marches on!

But as I think of it, the seasons of our living also have a way of providing a ground for us. We *do* wind up doing the same things year in and year out. And the more we move through these seasons, the more we know how to do all the things that make up our lives. Think of it: if we're in school, knowing that you've done this before is a comfort when it is time to head back. If we're accountants, once we've passed tax season, we know what it looks like. If we're retailers, we know what December feels like.

There is a familiarity about going through the seasons of life. And I think sometimes that very familiarity provides for us a means of looking at life in a fresh way, indeed of looking at faith in a fresh way. As we return to the routines of school and the end of summer, what better time to consider what disciplines we want to add to our lives to enrich them — so that there is something new in the midst of the familiar, to add life and excitement and growth.

So let me encourage you in this time of year when summer is coming to its end to think of how you would like to see your life enriched. If you've never participated in one of our fellowship groups, such as Theology on Tap or Couples Group or Lydia Circle, to name just a few, why not try it? If your attendance at worship has waned a bit, would making a discipline of worship on Sundays ground your faith in a way that offers greater support? Perhaps some fresh service through one of our mission efforts would add richness to your life.

Seasons come and seasons go, and we all know how to live through them. Why not seek some way to add more?

MPC Music Leads Us in Marking Somber and Joyful Sundays

The Chancel Choir will present two Sundays of special music in September. Sunday, Sept. 11 brings us to the tenth anniversary of the tragedy known as "9/11." A tenth anniversary deserves special attention, I believe-especially in remembering such a date in our history.

I will never forget the packed Morningside Sanctuary in 2001, on the Sunday following 9/11. The choir had rallied on the previous Wednesday night, changing all of our previously planned music, attempting to present music that would in some way comfort the congregation on such a Sunday.

For this anniversary, the Choir will present the "Agnus Dei" from Gabriel Fauré's "Requiem" (which we performed that Sunday in 2001), the second movement based on Psalm 23 from Leonard Bernstein's "Chichester Psalms," a chant for men's chorus that we

used to open the service 10 years ago and "The Canticle of the Turning" by Rory Cooney. Guest musicians will be boy soprano Eric Sturniolo from the Georgia Boy Choir and Charae Krueger, cellist.

Personal Story: Washington Trip Reveals New Service Opportunity

Back in March of 2010, Lloyd Prince and I were two of 13 members of the Morningside family who went on a mission trip to Washington D.C. We all learned and did a lot: sorted cans at a food bank, prepared food at a soup kitchen that served hundreds, served breakfast at a church shelter for the homeless, gave bag lunches to the homeless, and did yard work for a couple of elderly people in their eighties.

Actually we started working at one senior's home and the equally elderly neighbor asked if we could help next door while we were there. And we were glad to help. In fact, 'Miss Mary' and 'Mr. Eugene,' the senior citizens whose yards we improved, said they were touched, not only by our work in their yards— which they could no longer tend to—but that they also felt that the time we spent with them was as therapeutic. Their appreciation warmed our hearts.

Lloyd and I came home with the goal to use these experiences from this mission trip to enrich similar ministries at Morningside and in our community. We especially wanted to develop a program which addressed the needs of our seniors. We all may know someone (maybe a parent or neighbor) who wants both to stay independent and stay in his or her own home but who struggles

with repair and costs. Many of them don't have the energy or ability at their age to tackle the repairs themselves.

Now we have two groups with which Morningside partners to help these folks in need. H.O.M.E.S. (Home Owner Maintenance and Enhancement for Seniors) is one program of Senior Citizens Services of Metropolitan Atlanta that has been serving seniors since 1965. The second program we partner with is the annual Martin Luther King, Jr. holiday weekend workday sponsored by Decatur Preservation Alliance and the City of Decatur.

On these Saturdays we work from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. The work is usually light repairs and painting. Supplies are provided--all we need to supply are willing and able volunteers. The next HOMES workday is coming right up—it's Saturday, Sept. 10! Look for the signup sheet on a bulletin board in the hallway at church. Our next MLK workday will be Saturday, Jan. 14. If you have any questions please give Lloyd or me a call. We look forward to working with you all on these ministries.

(Ruthlyn Newell, our Clerk of Session, delivered this homily in worship Sunday, Aug. 7. We will reprint the other speakers' messages in future issues.)

Our Lord, Jesus Christ, has never strayed from my side. His steadfast love is, in fact, from everlasting to everlasting. I am loosely quoting verse 17 of the $103^{\rm rd}$ Psalm.

For most of my life I wasn't aware of Jesus's abiding love, of his constant presence. But when my unfailing good health turned into a diagnosis of advanced ovarian cancer 10-1/2 years ago, one of my immediate thoughts was to pray that God let me live long enough to see my two nephews grow up. They were 7 and 11 years old then.

My nephew Christopher turned 22 this spring and has aspirations of being a professional baseball player, a pitcher to be precise. He's big but shy and couldn't be any sweeter. As much as I love him, I don't think I could stand at home plate and let him throw a fastball at me. Alexander just graduated from Allatoona High School and is heading to the University of South Florida in about a week. Alex is outgoing and charismatic. The world is his oyster. I know he'll be just fine no matter his chosen path.

Yes, Jesus answered my initial prayer, but I've sent up countless others along my cancer journey. When I was a child I was taught not to pray for myself. But as my journey got tougher I added myself to my prayers. I needed to talk to the Lord about things. I needed to ask for his guidance as I faced tough treatment decisions. I needed to ask him to soothe me when I was afraid. I

needed to ask him to strengthen me when I didn't think I could endure the pain or the next indignity. He hasn't seemed to mind my selfish prayers a bit. They've pretty much turned into regular conversations at this point. I consider him to be a real partner in my battle against ovarian cancer. He's always, always there -- full of the love and grace I seek. I am forever thankful.

And that brings me to you. All of you. I want you to know for certain that your prayers and love continue to bolster me. It helps me so much when you tell me you're praying for me and that you love me. And it helps me when you demonstrate your love by telling me I look pretty, or by taking me to chemo or doctors' appointments, or by taking turns playing nurse after surgery. There are countless wonderful and loving things you do to help me. And I thank you.

Heaven knows—and I mean Heaven really <u>does</u> know—that I could not have survived two months of radiation treatments at MD Anderson in Houston without your prayers, your notes and cards that decorated my hotel room window, the elders and deacons' wonderful group holiday photo, all your e-mails. And your presence in my life. The Lord blesses me with your prayers and your love.

The Lord's steadfast love is from everlasting to everlasting. This I believe.
