From the Pastor's Desk



Dear Friends,

There is a somewhat dangerous false dichotomy between matter and spirit that is as old as the church itself. Indeed, Paul wrote about it extensively and what I mean by it is

this: we believe there are certain things that are material, and others that are spiritual. In this world-view, things like prayer, worship and study are considered spiritual, and things like money, plumbing and cutting the grass are considered material. Continuing in this world-view, things like prayer and worship are best attended to by learned spiritual professionals (that's me) and things like our budget and the building should be handled by toughminded pragmatists.

Self-referential jokes aside, there's something very wrong with this world-view: it's unbiblical. There is nothing in the Bible to suggest that money and allegedly "practical matters" can't have a spiritual value, just as there is nothing in the Bible to suggest that prayer and other more "esoteric matters" can't have material value. In fact, every time we affirm that we believe in the resurrection of the body when we say the Apostles' Creed, we are attesting that our world -view is a biblical world-view, where the material and the spiritual are indivisible. Explaining that will take more space than this column has, but that's the essential point: that there's no separation between material things and spiritual things.

That doesn't just extend to our corporate life as a congregation. It extends to our personal lives, as people. We aren't spiritual beings in physical bodies, and we aren't physical bodies that have something separate called a soulwe're completely integrated. We are who we are and every bit of us is important to God. It's all deeply connected.

All of which is to say, if we are living balanced, integrated lives, then we should be cognizant of where we are tempted to disintegrate. What I mean is if I am someone who prays with regularity but only gives what's in my pocket at the time of the offering, then I'm out of balance – there's no deliberateness. And if I am someone who writes big checks to cover the operating expenses, but I don't make time for prayer and worship, maybe I'm out of balance too.

It all comes back to this theme of discipleship that I've been developing over the past months...when Christ calls us; he calls our whole selves. Not just the material, not just the spiritual—because they were never divided in the first place. Just something I hope you'll think about.

Holy Week Opens Month of April with Palm Sunday Celebration

It's the most profound emotional roller-coaster in the church year. It opens and closes with celebrations, but with the deepest despair in between. It's known to Christians worldwide as Holy Week.

The ride begins—almost literally—with Jesus on a donkey colt entering Jerusalem to the cheers of the crowds and the suspicion of the Romans and Jewish officials. At Morningside, we'll mark Sunday, Apr. 1, with music and the waving of palm branches. Significantly, the dried palm branches become the ashes for next year's Ash Wednesday service.

Our Mediterranean-style meal on Maundy Thursday also has become an MPC tradition. We'll gather in Fellowship Hall at 6:15 p.m. Apr. 5 for supper followed by worship including the sacrament of communion. Those who want to come only for the worship service are welcome to join us at 7 p.m. The Congregational Nurture Team needs two things to make this event happen: your RSVPs to the church office (very important!) and helpers for three shifts: set up (4:30-6 p.m.), serving (6-7 p.m.) and clean up (7:30-8:15). The mood changes again on Saturday morning, Apr. 7, as we invite all kids—ours, their buddies, neighbors—for the "running of the eggs" on our campus. Beginning at 10:45 a.m., come enjoy Ruby the Clown as 'The Easter Bunny', face-painting and Easter cookies. The Egg Hunt sprints off at 11 a.m. Volunteers still needed! First shift (9:30-10 a.m.) jobs include egg hiding, tent set-up, and event setup. Second shift (10:30-11:45 a.m.) will manage the event itself, and the clean-up crew will begin work at 11:45 a.m. Bring donations of pre-filled eggs to the church early in the week. Easter Sunday will be joyous with flowers, Hallelujahs from the Chancel Choir and full pews long before 11 a.m. It's also the day MPC joins Presbyterians and Christians from seven other denominations in giving to the One Great Hour of Sharing offering. From 1949, this has been an ecumenical effort where all use their funds for ministries of disaster relief, refugee assistance and development aid. In recent years, Presbyterians have given about \$10 million annually to support the good work of Self-Development of People, Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, and the Presbyterian Hunger Program. Plan to join others in the One Great Hour of Sharing, when sharing our resources will change lives.

Survey Results Spur Session's Ongoing Efforts

So, you filled out the survey about our church. Or you meant to, but didn't get around to it. Or you thought, "Why bother?" Regardless of where you fell on the spectrum, MPC received enough responses to make the findings statistically valid and to give Session a great starting point to dig deeper into the meaning of the results. And you can help with this process.

After an afternoon examining what the survey said about our congregation's highest priorities, Session has identified five areas for which they'd like more input from all of us. Elders are being trained in how to discuss these questions with groups in a consistent manner so that the outcomes will compare "apples to apples". Feedback sessions will be held at meetings (such as Theology on Tap, Women's Roundtable, etc.) over the next two month as well as at a few before-orafter church sessions anyone can attend.

The five areas that need more definition are 1. Connecting with visitors and the community; and connecting new members to MPC; 2. Christian education: When, where, what? to

reach all ages and stages; 3. Spiritual vitality: How to deepen spiritual connection for MPC members? 4. Caring for one another; and 5. Caring for the world around us. Within each topic, discussions should explore stewardship (time, talent, treasure) and whether these ideas represent needs or wants.

According to the survey, MPC members are overwhelmingly satisfied, which suggests very high church morale compared with other congregations. Scores for satisfaction with our worship and music were literally "off the charts". Another highly-rated area is freedom from conflict. The level of concern about conflict shared by our participants was extraordinarily low.

Other significant findings are that Morningside tends to be theologically progressive and quite adaptable. Combining those results with our overall apparent unity, MPC's leadership should be poised to develop plans for the future and move forward, and to believe that the congregation will be willing to invest in accomplishing them. Watch for opportunities to enter into the input process and pray for us as we go about the task of building our discipleship.

Preschool Will Provide Kindergarten Program This Year

Morningside Presbyterian Preschool Kindergarten Class will begin this fall. The class will be from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Monday through Friday, following the Atlanta Public School calendar except for the start date which will be Aug.27. This dynamic half-day Kindergarten will emphasize child-centered learning which encourages creativity, fun and academic success. The comprehensive curriculum prepares children for first grade by addressing the whole child — in areas of social, academic and physical growth.

"We believe children learn best when they are encouraged to be active learners and have designed our program with that in mind," says MPP Director Sarah Tomaka. "Our Kindergarten has the advantages of fewer transitions, a low teacher-student ratio, a shorter day and the warm, nurturing community of Morningside Presbyterian. We are in the process of hiring qualified teachers who are well-versed in performance standards, assessments and curriculum. In keeping with our Mission, we intend to serve the children of this community, teach them that they are loved by God and accepted in this community of faith. MPC Adopts 'Mercer on Mission' in Liberia as Global-Concern Project

MPC will again partner with Mercer on Mission as it sends 12 education students to Liberia, West Africa, under the leadership of MPC Elder and Mercer Professor Emilie Paille and Mercer Christianity Professor Richard Wilson. Here's Emilie 's description of this effort:

For the past five years, Mercer on Mission, an initiative at Mercer University, has sent students and faculty from various schools within the University to developing countries to work alongside people striving to improve conditions in their home countries.

This year, Mercer will send approximately 130 students and 12 faculty members to nine countries. (For more information: www.mercer.edu/mom)

The group journeying to Liberia will teach at Ricks Institute, a K-12 school, for three weeks this summer. This will be the third year that Paille and Wilson have led this work in Liberia. Last year, MPC donated money to the Mercer team going to Liberia. We used the money to buy books for the Mercer teachers to

read aloud in their elementary classes. We selected this as an important focus because hearing books read aloud allows children to hear "book" language, enjoy good stories, and help develop important skills that transfer to reading ability. Literacy in Liberia is very low: 38.3 percent of the total population, with males at 53.9 percent and females at just 22.4 percent. Reading is a struggle for many Ricks students. Morningside's gift of books was very important. With the money you gave us, we were able to take 63 books, selected to meet the interests and background knowledge of the listeners as well as could be predicted from afar. The books were well received, read daily, and were left in classroom sets for teachers to continue to read in their classes.

Joanna Adams, Pastoral Colleagues Seek 'Higher Ground'

We all know 'retirement' is just a hypothetical concept for MPC's *pastor emerita*, the Rev. Joanna M. Adams, but freedom from preparing a weekly sermon and other congregational duties has allowed her more time to follow many of her passions, including interfaith dialog.

Their personalities are as varied as their faiths. Reverend Roberts followed in the footsteps of Martin Luther King, serving 30 years as senior pastor at historic Ebenezer Baptist Church. "I was born in the African Methodist Episcopal Church. Then I became a Presbyterian, and now I'm a Baptist. I don't know which team is going to win but I



thought I better cover all of the bases so I would have a chance to make it," says Rev. Roberts.

"The perspectives are diverse but everybody wants to be a good influence on one another and also on the city of Atlanta. We want to give something," says Imam El-Amin. Adds Rabbi Sugarman, "To help people understand that when they know of a problem not just to shrug their shoulders, oh that's too bad, what

can I do about it? That's it, to place the question right in front of them, what can I do about it?"

"I just think this city is a place where we can show civilization a better way. Not to ignore difference but to understand that difference actually comes from God. We wouldn't be different if God hadn't made us that way," is Joanna's viewpoint.

"Shares of stock" in youth attending the Middle School Montreat Conference at Presbyterian College will go on sale closer to the July trip. Also approved were the "We Believe" and "Worship for Life" curricula for elementary-age classes. Mission Camp registration is available on-line now and VBS registration will begin right after Easter.
- James Klotz, who has applied to four seminaries and been accepted by all four—Princeton, Columbia, Union, and Austin—asked Session to endorse his enrollment as an inquirer with the Presbytery of Greater Atlanta, a request which was enthusiastically approved.
- Preschool Director Sarah Tomaka introduced a
 motion from the Preschool Committee to begin a half
 -day kindergarten program this fall. The new class
 could accommodate 14 children and require two
 teachers. Session unanimously approved this significant step in the growth of our preschool.
- Prince described a change in how we welcome new members. A new Inquirers' Class will be offered regularly for anyone who is considering joining or is curious about our theology, history and the way our denomination is governed.
