Dear friends,

I want to write to you about giving.

In your commitment mailing, I wrote to you that church is that which gives us sustenance for

all the other things that we do.

I really believe that. Tom Long tells a story about his time on the Chapel Advisory Board of Princeton University. I'm paraphrasing him, but what he said roughly is, "It's a great gig. Once a year you go to a luncheon and they tell you about the chapel ministry. One year, when the university chaplain was talking about the good work that the students were doing, the Jewish University Chaplain began to smile. Eventually, his smiling became so distracting that the Christian Chaplain turned and said, 'Is something amusing you?' And the Jewish University Chaplain replied, 'Oh, no, I was just thinking that what you're really saying is that the students are good people, and they are. And you said they do good works, and they do. But you haven't said anything about a vision of redemption. And without a vision of redemption, the world will just beat you down.'"

Tom said they all turned and stared at the Jewish University Chaplain.

Of course, he's right, you know.

I serve as the chair of the board of Intown Collaborative Ministries. The agency is devoted to reversing hunger and homelessness right here near the church. And the thing about it is that we know the work is never going to be done. We're not going to wipe out hunger or homelessness in Atlanta. The whole endeavor could feel hopeless. But it doesn't.

It doesn't feel hopeless because of the very thing that I climb up into a pulpit to proclaim once a week, and that you gather to hear: that God changes things. That Jesus died to redeem the sin of the world and that in God's xairos time, that redemption is occurring and will continue to occur until one day we find that the whole world is made new.

I am writing to you about giving because that is how we respond to what Jesus has done. We give our time, our money, our love because God has given us everything.

It's not a guilt trip. It's not an obligation any more than anything else you do for your family. But it's the only way we have to respond to God. And it makes a difference for us together as a church, for the city of Atlanta and for all of God's world.

ADVENT is a time of preparation for the birth of our Lord that stirs together introspective waiting and joyous anticipation. It is the season in which our faith bids us to turn from the frantic three-month-march toward Christmas, and instead wind our way up a hillside near Bethlehem to spend a few unhurried weeks among shepherds and sheep listening for an angel's greeting. But *before* we begin this humble season, we are invited to engage in the advent of Advent with a four-week study of the Gospel of James. This is a non-canonical Gospel, which means we won't find it in the Bible, yet it provides a fascinating glimpse into the lives of Mary and Joseph and prompts an excavation through the layers of fact, fable and faith.

The class will be held on the four Sundays of November, at 9:45 a.m. in room 201, and taught by Rev. Dana Hughes.

Dana is a professional Interim Pastor, former Moderator of the Presbytery of Greater Atlanta, wife, mother, gardener, poet, artist, and keeper of chickens, and she looks forward to teaching this class at Morningside Presbyterian!

Baron's Message on Commitment - in case you missed it...

Every year, there is a pitch for pledging that comes to you in the mail from the church. Your commitment committee is not naïve; we know that this appeal comes amidst many competing requests for your time and treasure – we know that your children's schools ask, we know that your universities ask, we know that our members serve on the boards of worthwhile charities, and they ask. There are hospices, disease societies, animal rescue agencies – there is simply no shortage of worthwhile organizations doing good work who ask for your dollars and your hours.

As well they all should. The church does not have the market on the Lord's work cornered. I give to my schools, the agency whose board I chair and the elementary school in my neighborhood. But the lion's share always goes to Morningside.

So I believe there is unique value about the church when it comes to your commitment. My belief is based upon this: church is where we go to receive the sustenance that makes all of the rest of our giving of ourselves possi-

ble. Our commitment theme for this year builds upon previous years – from “running the race” we come to “living God's love.” Each year builds upon the previous years with the end goal always being that we respond in our lives, as a faith community, to what God has done for us.

And God has indeed blessed us. In the Old Testament, it is always clear that God's blessing comes, not with strings attached, but rather with an expectation that God's people are in turn a blessing to the others we encounter. So, too, this expectation comes through the New Testament as well – that what Jesus did for us matters in our lives.

So it is that we know that as we run the race of life, that God calls us to live the love that we have received – to live it for ourselves as a church, and to live it for the world around us that needs us to be a blessing.


RHO Readers Welcome Best-selling Local Author Mary Kay Andrews on Nov. 17

Your Session at Work: October 21 Meeting


- Children and Youth Ministries is excited to report the addition of a new element during children's worship - a music program with Kyle von Newmann of Eclectic Music.




Jim's Big Day at the Ballpark!
